The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Taxes.

FIRST READING OF SENATE BILLS

S. F. No. 233, A bill for an act relating to health; providing additional accrediting organization for ambulatory health care; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 62Q.37, subdivision 2.

The bill was read for the first time.

Zerwas moved that S. F. No. 233 and H. F. No. 523, now on the General Register, be referred to the Chief Clerk for comparison. The motion prevailed.

S. F. No. 1293, A bill for an act relating to public safety; expanding the offense of fifth degree criminal sexual conduct; creating the crime of adulteration by bodily fluid; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 609.3451, subdivision 1; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 609.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Public Safety and Crime Prevention Policy and Finance.

S. F. No. 1504, A bill for an act relating to health; changing the expiration date for e-Health Advisory Committee, the Trauma Advisory Council, and the Maternal and Child Health Advisory Task Force; suggesting review of data collection on stillbirths and prenatal protocols to prevent stillbirths; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, sections 62J.495, subdivision 2; 144.608, subdivision 2; 145.8811, subdivision 1.

The bill was read for the first time.

Pierson moved that S. F. No. 1504 and H. F. No. 1714, now on the Calendar for the Day, be referred to the Chief Clerk for comparison. The motion prevailed.

S. F. No. 1698, A bill for an act relating to commerce; weights and measures; modifying the commissioner of commerce's powers; clarifying diesel fuel advertisement sign requirements; modifying the definition for ethanol flex fuels; updating fuel standard references; correcting cross-references; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, sections 239.011, subdivision 2; 239.44; 239.751, by adding a subdivision; 239.761, subdivisions 3, 4, 6, 10, 11, 13, by adding a subdivision; 296A.01, subdivisions 7, 8, 19, 23, 24.

The bill was read for the first time.

Loonan moved that S. F. No. 1698 and H. F. No. 1625, now on the General Register, be referred to the Chief Clerk for comparison. The motion prevailed.

S. F. No. 1765, A bill for an act relating to health; modifying definitions; increasing the permitted ratio of pharmacy technicians to pharmacists; increasing the size of the Board of Pharmacy; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, sections 151.01, subdivisions 15a, 27; 151.02; 151.102.

The bill was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Health and Human Services Finance.

CALENDAR FOR THE DAY

S. F. No. 997 was reported to the House.

Schomacker moved to amend S. F. No. 997, the first engrossment, as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert the following language of H. F. No. 954, as introduced:

"Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 62S.23, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **Inflation protection feature.** (a) No insurer may offer a long-term care insurance policy unless the insurer also offers to the policyholder, in addition to any other inflation protection, the option to purchase a policy that provides for benefit levels to increase with benefit maximums or reasonable durations which are meaningful to account for reasonably anticipated increases in the costs of long-term care services covered by the policy. In addition to other options that may be offered, insurers must offer to each policyholder, at the time of purchase, the option to purchase a policy with an inflation protection feature no less favorable than one of the following:

- (1) increases benefit levels annually in a manner so that the increases are compounded annually at a rate not less than five percent;
- (2) guarantees the insured individual the right to periodically increase benefit levels without providing evidence of insurability or health status so long as the option for the previous period has not been declined. The amount of the additional benefit shall be no less than the difference between the existing policy benefit and that benefit compounded annually at a rate of at least five percent for the period beginning with the purchase of the existing benefit and extending until the year in which the offer is made; or
- (3) covers a specified percentage of actual or reasonable charges and does not include a maximum specified indemnity amount or limit.
- (b) A long-term care partnership policy must provide the inflation protection described in this subdivision. If the policy is sold to an individual who:
- (1) has not attained age 61 as of the date of purchase, the policy must provide compound annual inflation protection;
- (2) has attained age 61, but has not attained age 76 as of such date, the policy must provide some level of inflation protection; and
- (3) has attained the age of 76 as of such date, the policy may, but is not required to, provide some level of inflation protection.

Inflation protection for a long-term care partnership policy may not be less than three <u>one</u> percent per year or a rate based on changes in the Consumer Price Index. The commissioner, however, may approve other types of inflation protection that comply with this section and further the goals of the partnership program.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective July 1, 2015, and applies to coverage sold on or after that date."

Delete the title and insert:

"A bill for an act relating to insurance; long-term care; reducing the minimum permitted inflation protection for a long-term care insurance partnership policy; continuing to permit other types of inflation protection; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 62S.23, subdivision 1."

The motion prevailed and the amendment was adopted.

Hoppe moved to amend S. F. No. 997, the first engrossment, as amended, as follows:

Page 1, after line 6, insert:

"Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 62A.48, subdivision 4, is amended to read:

Subd. 4. **Loss ratio.** The anticipated loss ratio for long-term care policies must not be less than 65 percent for policies issued on a group basis or 60 percent for policies issued on an individual or mass-market basis. The commissioner shall approve subsequent rate increases that comply with the National Association of Insurance Commissioners Model Bulletin 031813, including the 80 percent loss ratio requirement. This subdivision does not apply to policies issued on or after January 1, 2002, that comply with sections 62S.021 and 62S.081."

Renumber the sections in sequence and correct the internal references

Amend the title accordingly

Atkins moved to amend the Hoppe amendment to S. F. No. 997, the first engrossment, as amended, as follows:

Page 1, after line 2, insert:

"Section 1. [62A,241] DISABILITY INCOME COVERAGE; PROHIBITED PROVISION.

No policy, contract, certificate, or agreement offered or issued in this state providing for disability income protection coverage may contain a provision purporting to provide a standard of review that is inconsistent with the laws of this state, or less favorable to the enrollee when a claim is denied than a preponderance of the evidence standard.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective January 1, 2016, and applies to policies issued or renewed on or after that date."

The motion prevailed and the amendment to the amendment was adopted.

The question recurred on the Hoppe amendment, as amended, to S. F. No. 997, the first engrossment, as amended. The motion prevailed and the amendment, as amended, was adopted.

The bill was read for the third time, as amended, and placed upon its final passage.

(2) an agreement that the owner and the owner's employees and agents are subject to the sections in chapter 72A and in Minnesota Rules, chapter 2790, regarding the marketing of the insurance coverage described in this section and the conduct of persons involved in the sale of the insurance coverage in the same manner as if they were licensed."

Page 2, line 14, delete everything after "owner"

Page 2, delete line 15 and insert "provides to the occupant written notice that:"

Page 2, line 16, delete "summarize" and insert "summarizes"

Page 2, line 18, delete "disclose" and insert "discloses"

Page 2, line 27, delete "state" and insert "states"

Page 2, line 30, delete "describe" and insert "describes"

Page 3, line 5, after "program" insert ", which must be submitted to the commissioner for approval,"

Renumber the paragraphs in sequence and correct the internal references
